Stretch and relax is a new initiative in 2015/16. A survey of all Key Stage 1 children found:

In all classes only a small minority (2-3) if any did not claim to enjoy stretch and relaxation sessions.

Of note two that said they did not like it because their heads hurt a bit lying flat on the mats. When a small cushion was offered many others said it would make it better for them too.

Of those who enjoyed it only 1 or 2 at most in each class said they would not like it to happen every week. In fact more said they would like a session every day.

Reasons included:

It makes me feel calm

It relaxes my body and I have more energy to run.

I like keeping calm and I can rest if I'm tired.

Many children talked of loving learning how to do new stretches and making their brains really think.

The majority also said it was fun

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Report to Governors and Parents: 2015 - 2016

Since 2013/14 the government has provided additional funding of £150 million per annum to improve provision of physical education (PE) and sport in primary schools. This funding - provided jointly by the Departments for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport was allocated to primary school headteachers. This funding was ring-fenced and therefore could only be spent on provision of PE and sport in schools.

Funding for schools was calculated by reference to the number of primary-aged pupils (between the ages of 5 and 11), as recorded in the annual schools census in January of each year.

In 2015-16 the school was allocated £8,500
